With this photograph, Emmet Gowin wanted to create a new **perspective** of the world and capture it the way it really is, without altering the photograph in any way. Gowin took this image while he was up in a plane looking down on the earth, giving us an **aerial view**, like a bird would see it.

He was drawn to taking this photograph, but he was surprised to see the world from this perspective too. Have you ever been in a plane before? What did the world look like to you from the sky?

A Bird's Eye or Worm's Eye View Activity

Go outside. Look at something in a new way - while standing on a chair, laying on the ground, or sitting in a tree. Draw what you see. First, imagine what you see from above, like a bird. Next, create a second drawing as if you are a bug, small animal, or a worm. How would the world look to you? How do these landscapes differ from other landscapes you have created? Use the other side of this paper for your first drawing. Use another paper for your second drawing. Compare each drawing when you are done. What did you discover?
