Taking Time to Look

Use the following questions to help guide your careful looking of works of art.

Looking at art is a slow process that, with patience, that can lead to many discoveries. It allows you to dig deeper and uncover the possible meanings behind an artwork. Taking time to look carefully will naturally create more questions for you, some of which might have more than one answer, and that's ok! The answers that you find in your exploration will give you the knowledge to form your own opinions and judgments on the artwork.

Artwork Selected:
1. What do you see? List all the details that you can find. (This would include the colors, shapes, lines, textures, and all the visual elements in the work.) What else do you see?
2. What words would you use to describe this artwork?
3. Where does your eye travel to in this work? What elements draw your eye to these areas?
4. How did this artist create this artwork? What materials were used?
5. Does this artwork remind you of anything?
6. Why do you think this artist created this artwork? Explain.

7. Does the title of the artwork help you understand the work? Why or why not?
8. If this artwork could tell a story , what would it say?
9. Does this artwork convey a message ? Why or why not? Explain.
10. What mood or emotions do you feel when looking at this work of art? What elements help convey this mood? Explain.
11. Pretend you are inside this artwork. What does it feel like? Use your five senses to explain your experience.
12. What do you think is worth remembering about this artwork?
